


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# PathPointe May 2017

And ye shall seek me, and find me, when ye shall search for me with all your heart.

Jeremiah 29:13

There is truly one word which stands out in this Scripture. The word is "all". That one word lets us know what we can expect with half-hearted service, worship, giving, and obedience. When most are not truly expecting a move of God in their lives, they need only to look at this one Scripture. God can be seen in many things, and that is only due to His character and attributes. Sure we can see God in His creation and hear Him in some music, but we only find Him when we truly and sincerely search for Him.

Note also God did not say to search with our eyes, ears, or mind as much as we should our heart. Why the heart? Relationships are rooted in the heart. While God can be seen in many things, He can only be experienced in a loving relationship. If the heart is not involved, what you have is just a religion. God sees what we do for Him, but He would much rather we do things with Him. Even the worship God desires is from the heart, not just the head.

So how do you know if you are searching for God with all your heart? It will be evident by the things the heart gives. When we truly love, we give certain elements of ourselves. Let's look at some of the most important ones: time, money, and attention.

Because of how fast time slips by, it is extremely valuable. When we were teens we were in such a hurry to grow up, and now that we are grown, we are telling teens to slow down. Why? Because we all know how fast time will pass. When you dearly love something, you will gladly spend time cultivating it. When you love a person, you desire to nurture and spend time with them. You want to know them and everything about them. God wants us to desire Him that way. He wants to know we are willing to give up valuable time to spend with Him. God doesn't want us to spend time with Him because we have to, but that we desire to. He doesn't want just the time we have left over once we have done everything else we have to do. He loves and asks for our first fruits. This is why we worship corporately on Sunday, the first day of the week. How much time are you daily and weekly spending with God?

Another heart element deals with our finances. When we love someone or something, we don't mind spending our money there. Billions are spent yearly on material things people love and think will make them happy. But unselfish love desires to give to others rather than to oneself. When we love God, we wholeheartedly support His work through our tithes, offerings, and gifts to help others in need. After all, the Bible does teach we are most like God when we give. As one preacher said, "Show me your checkbook and I will show you what and who you love."

Another element of the heart is what it gives attention to. If someone or something has your heart, it has your attention. God will not be part of a divided interest. He has given us first place in His heart and expects the same from us, a true heart. For some, God is not the center focus, but simply an add-on to the many things that has their attention. There is a world of distractions that can pull at our attention. People, careers, money, sports, shopping, hobbies, food, and the list continues. While life is full of things that can draw our attention, nothing should be more important than God. Without a doubt, we have His attention, but does He have our undivided attention?

May we daily examine our hearts to see if we are truly searching for God. Evaluate your time, finances, and attention and see if you have given God not only a place to visit, but a place to stay.

# Purposeful Selection

There's a great principle all of us need to realize when we pick up the Bible and study it, and that is, the Bible is built upon a *purposeful selection*. This can be illustrated from last two chapters of John.

And there are also many other things which Jesus did, the which, if they should be written every one, I suppose that not even the world itself could not contain the books that should be written.

John 21:25

And many other signs truly did Jesus in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written,



that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through His name.

John 20:30-31

John says Jesus did so much and His life was so full of meaning that if a man were to write down everything Jesus did, the world itself could not contain the books that could be written. Consequently, what you have in the Bible is a *purposeful selection* of isolated events as directed by the Holy Spirit for John to write.

The Holy Spirit guided John to write specific things for a specific purpose. He selected this incident, and that story, and this parable, and this miracle, out of a vast volume of things which John witnessed.

Our lives are the same way. Most of us cannot possibly accomplish all the things we would like to accomplish. Neither can we always give to every worthy cause brought before us. Therefore, just like John, we must be guided by the Holy Spirit to make a *purposeful selection*. The choices are not always easy.

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## **Background Heroes**

The Bible is full of many examples of great men and women of God. We have examples of men like Daniel, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego. Men that were willing to stand up for the Lord regardless of the consequences they might face. We think of David's unshakeable faith when he courageously stood up to Goliath, while others much stronger than he were too afraid. We think of Esther confronting King Ahasuerus on behalf of her Jewish countrymen which Haman was plotting to destroy. Had it not been for her bravery, many Jews would have perished. Then there's Moses. While hesitant and doubtful at first, he soon led God's people out of Egyptian captivity.

What great heroes of the faith! Examples for us all to follow. However, maybe sometimes you feel as though you're not quite measuring up. You haven't led thousands to Christ like Billy Graham. You weren't called to give up everything and live on the mission field. You don't speak with great authority or teach a Sunday school class. 
As we read of many great heroes of the Faith in God's Word, we don't have to look far behind the star of the story to see others who played just as big of a role.

In the battle against the Amalekites, Moses had Aaron and Hur there to hold up his arms so that the Israelites could win. We don't even know the name of another hero. She was a Jewish servant girl, a maid for the wife of Naaman, the captain of the Syrian army. If you remember, Naaman had leprosy and called on the prophet of God, Elisha, to heal him. How did he hear of Elisha? You guessed it! The unnamed Jewish servant.

These are just a few examples of heroes behind the heroes, and the Bible has many more. They give hope to all of us. Not everyone is called to be at the forefront or in the spotlight, but that doesn't mean your task is of any less importance. You can be there to lead and guide younger Christians in the faith. You can write letters and notes of encouragement to others who are on the frontlines. Most importantly, you can offer up prayers on the behalf of others to the God and Creator of the universe. If you are still living on this earth, God can use you. He is not done with you yet. You have a purpose... a great purpose! You can be a hero, too. Ask God to use you and give you opportunities to be a hero for Him.



May this be my epitaph!


Thank you, Lord, for my mother!

(A visitor had come to our church. She was in tears and desperate for the peace of God...)


I continued and told her how once Christ came, the people were already familiar with the lamb sacrifice. Jesus was introduced as the Lamb of God. That was the purpose Christ came – to be a sacrifice for us. That is why we no longer offer animal sacrifices, because Christ has come and been offered for us. I told her how He lived a pure and holy life, and that was the only reason His sacrifice was acceptable to the Father. Jesus being raised from the dead three days later was proof of God's acceptance of Jesus' offering of Himself. Her eyes were continuing to open, and she was starting to remember more as I talked. She said it was all starting to make more sense now.

I again told her a life with Christ would not be an easy one. It was His enemies who killed Him, though He allowed it because it was God's plan.

I told her how choosing God meant she would have new enemies and probably lose friends she thought she had. However, choosing God and Christ would also place her in the family of God: He would become her Heavenly Father and protector, and once you enter God's family, you are never kicked out. God adopts you and calls you His child and sees you the same as He sees His only Son, Jesus. Jesus' past is exchanged for yours. He died on that cross for you, but also as you. Once you ask to get saved, Jesus will wash all your sins away with His powerful, cleansing blood. Your sins will be cast as far as the east is from the west in God's eyes. Yes, getting saved will cost you, I told her. But you sure gain a whole lot more in return. You will never, never be alone again. At this her whole body relaxed and she was nearly in tears all over again.

Throughout our conversation I had continued to stress getting saved would not answer all her troubles nor make her life easy. Christ never promised that. So at this point, I asked her if she did indeed want to ask Christ to be her Saviour - not because of ease, but because she saw she was a sinner and needed Him to cleanse her. She said yes, yes she did. We knelt and prayed, and I led her in a declaration of accepting God's standards, of believing His Word, that she was indeed a sinner and she needed a Saviour, Jesus. She had sinned against God. She declared believing Christ died for her, and He rose again the third day. She thanked Him for making her His child and taking her into His kingdom. Hallelujah! My heart sang, but more importantly, hers did. She sobbed in my arms and held onto me tightly for a long time. Once she could talk she cried how clean and new she felt. I told her it was because she was new. God had made her into a new creature. I told her the angels were rejoicing in Heaven right now because "one sinner came to repentance." I also told her how God's Spirit was now living inside her, and He would never leave her. She started telling me how she had to call her mom. I later learned of how she told the next stranger she saw. This made my spirit smile and soar.

We finished with some advice. I told her though her sins had been forgiven, that did not mean she was going to be perfect from now on. I told her her sins were all paid for: past, present, and future. We are sinners saved by grace, but we grow in that grace. Having our sins paid for does not mean we sin freely, rather it gives us assurance that our salvation is permanent. We do, however, come to God for restoration of fellowship after we sin. I told her of some good radio stations she could listen to for music and Scriptural preaching. I told her it was important she listen to sound teaching to help her be guided in her way. I recommended certain preachers who had proven to be steadfast to God and His Word. Lastly, I told her prayer and Bible reading were a way to show her love to God and a way He could teach her about His. Prayer is simply talking to God. We are to be respectful and grateful when we come to Him, but we also confide in and open up to Him. He already knows all about it and He wants you to talk to Him. It is not always about bending on your knees in reverence, though that is very important. I told her it is also "Good morning, God. Thank You for today. What can I do for You?" and "Hello, Lord. It's me again. I need some help with my car. Can You help me?" Again, her eyes seemed to open up. I then explained the Bible was God's Book to us. Part of showing Him our love is in how interested we are in



His Word and in how we obey it. I told her not to expect to understand everything she read. (Do we really want a God whom we understood everything about?) I told her to take what she did understand and obey it. Memorize it and place it in her heart. Write notes around the house, the car and work to help her memorize it and make it a part of her life. God would guide her through His Word and His Spirit. As she memorized God would bring those Scriptures to her mind when she faced situations and needed guidance.

We left the room and found the only two people left in church. She immediately began to tell of what Christ had done for her. Though she struggled with anxiety due to her

original situation, she now knew she wasn't alone.

I never saw this lady again. She had to flee abuse and seek refuge far away. I am so glad I took such great lengths to help her understanding of the cross. Had I taken the shorter route, she would likely have been back in despair within days. God's guidance to me ended up being a pathway for this lady to start her journey on. 

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


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# Monument Or Mission?

In today's economy, is it wise to raise money to build and operate Christian radio stations? Actually, encouraging listeners to contribute funding is inherently neither right nor wrong. In some cases, God is glorified through the financing, construction, and operation of a Christian radio station. In other cases, through massive indebtedness, incompetence, extravagance, pride, and facility misuse, God is dishonored. Obviously, prayer is always needed before you contribute.

I know during times of economic hardship people may criticize a ministry by saying, "If that money was given to the poor, far greater things could be accomplished." This is sometimes true and it will need prayerful consideration. On the other hand, by serving the Christian community and reaching out to the unsaved, a Scriptural ministry provides evangelism, encouragement, and edification. Ultimately, the poor and hurting may be ministered to in a far greater degree because of the investment that was made in the faithful ministry.

We must continually strive to be sure the burden of funding, building, and maintaining radio stations doesn't become our main mission. At *GoMix Christian Radio*, our mission has never been radio stations, *it is people*. Distractions from this mission cannot be accepted. We must consciously battle the rationalizations that so often turn churches and Christian organizations away from building Christ's kingdom to building their own.

Some things, like the Cape Hatteras Lighthouse, can serve two distinct and worthwhile purposes. It assuredly served a very useful mission, yet it is also recognized as a grand historic monument. The dividing lines for ministries are not quite as clear. So for us, we shall strive to forgo the illusion of a monument. You see, just like your church building, Christian radio stations should be tools for ministry, not monuments to man.
