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

My Hometown...

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My wife was looking at an old picture of one of our sons a couple of days ago, and she commented on how much his children resembled him when he was young. She was right. We often comment about how we see the parents in their children. If not physically, then we might see the parents through their mannerisms. We have all seen how the characteristics of parents pass on to their kids. You may have a big nose from your granddad or a beautiful smile from your mother. You might be short or tall based on the physical traits of your ancestors, but one thing is sure; much of who you are is influenced by heredity.

Heredity also has an influence on your talents, abilities, traits, and even how you think and behave. We have all heard the phrase, "Like father, like son." But did you know that it can be just as true in the spiritual realm as it is in the natural? Set theology aside for a moment.

Common sense tells us that behavior, just like physical characteristics of height, weight, hair color, and complexion, tend to run in families. In the same way, certain tendencies to sin can be passed from generation to generation. This is particularly true of addictive behaviors such as alcoholism. Similarly, physical and sexual abuse might become ingrained in the psychological legacy of certain families.

A scientific study revealed that not only do we pass along the DNA sequence to our children, but they also discovered that additional information can be inherited and transmitted through generations. In an experiment, researchers trained mice to fear a fruity odor by pairing it with a mild electric shock to the foot. Ten days later, the mice were allowed to mate. Incredibly, their pups feared the odor even without having encountered the smell before. But even more

fascinating is that the offspring of those pups, the grandchildren, were born with the same specific memory.

Now, let's put that under the spiritual microscope for a moment. Suddenly, your habits may have far greater implications for your kids than you ever imagined. If we become addicted, we can pass along to our children gene instructions that may make them more vulnerable to the same addictions. Take pornography addiction for example. According to a recent study, 68 percent of Christian men are addicted to porn. Most likely, they are unaware of the potential hereditary ramifications of not gaining victory over this weakness.

Probably the most devastating consequence is that God says that if you are in some form of bondage to sin and don't get an effective plan for dealing with it, it can be passed on to your kids. Of course, it is possible to

break the curse. You can go either way. You can pass along either positive or negative charactistics, depending on the choices you make in life.

But here's the big question: If a Christian is set free from his past after being born-again, why are there so many believers who still see the effects of generational curses in their lives? Could it be because we are not applying the power we have in Christ to deal with it? Once we are saved by grace, we can truly have the mind of Christ which transforms our behavior. Suddenly, we are empowered to break the curses, knowing that the blood of Christ covers us. This transformation is physically revealed in the genetic changes in our bodies, but also on the legacy we will be leaving behind.

Don't think of it as a battle you're just fighting for yourself. You're fighting for the very lineage that God will give you. It is not irreversible. Spiritual deliverance is available to everyone who sincerely calls upon the name of the Lord. Generational influences have the ability to bring blessings, or curses, to your life and to those who will follow.

Family is important to God, and it is clear that He does not think merely in terms of individuals but also in terms of generations.

"So all the generations from Abraham to David are fourteen generations; and from David until the carrying away into Babylon are fourteen generations; and from the carrying away into Babylon unto Christ are fourteen generations." Matthew 1:17

When God looks at you, He also sees your family. He sees where you came

from. He looks at your ancestors, and He looks at those who will come after you; your children and grandchildren.

When making a covenant with Abraham, God never once said, "I'm going to bless you." He always said, "I am going to bless you and your descendants." We read an example of this in the book of Genesis where God said:

"That in blessing I will bless thee, and in multiplying I will multiply thy seed as the stars of the heaven, and as the sand which is upon the sea shore; and thy seed shall possess the gate of his enemies; And in thy seed shall all the nations of the earth be blessed; because thou hast obeyed my voice." Genesis 22:17-18

Abraham obeyed God and was blessed, and his descendants were blessed, too, because blessings tend to run along blood lines. But, curses also run along blood lines. In the Old Testament God warns the children of Israel not to follow false gods, saying, "I the Lord thy God am a jealous

God, visiting the iniquity of the fathers upon the children unto the third and fourth generation of them that hate me; And shewing mercy unto thousands of them that love me, and keep my commandments."

Exodus 20:5-6

The word "iniquity" means to be bent toward a certain sin, and we see that the iniquity of the parents is carried on to the children to the third and fourth generations. So, a child can be bent like his or her parents, grandparents, and great grandparents. Although each person has a free will, the child may have an inner inclination toward the same certain sinful habits as their ancestors. Lamentations 5:7 says, "Our fathers have sinned, and are not; and we have borne their iniquities."

In other words, even though they may be dead and in the grave, their iniquity is sticking with you. **Deuteronomy 28:15-68** contains fifty-three verses listing generational curses. There you can find everything from poverty to perversion listed in the Scriptures.





Each of these can be, but are not always, the result of a generational curse. Most people can identify some of these symptoms that have passed on from generation to generation. When you look at your family tree, do you see a pattern of any of these things? Do these things exist in your life?

Do you struggle with a particular sin and see a history of that sin in past generations? Maybe you've been told that the depression or fear you deal with runs in the family or perhaps you struggle with marital infidelity and can identify a pattern of affairs and divorce going back to a parent and grandparent. These could be symptoms of a generational curse. The good news is that generational curses can be stopped through the blood of Jesus Christ. Hebrews 9:22 tells us, "and almost all things are by the law purged with blood; and without shedding of blood is no remission." It is all about the blood of Jesus Christ.

"For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God; Being justified freely by his grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus: Whom God hath set forth to be a propitiation through faith in his blood, to declare his righteousness for the remission of sins that are past, through the forbearance of God; To declare, I say, at this time his righteousness: that he might be just, and the justifier of him which believeth in Jesus."

Romans 3:23-25

To define "justified" in simple terms, you could say, "I've been made just as if I'd never done it, just as if it never happened." The same is true of deliverance from generational iniquities and curses. These are included in what the Bible calls the "sins that are past," and just as salvation must be appropriated through faith. Until you personally appropriate Jesus' sacrifice through faith, it is not effective in your life, and the curse can remain. However. the generational curse will be cancelled when you, through faith, appropriate the blood of Jesus for your deliverance.

We saw previously how God visits the iniquity of the fathers upon the children to the third and fourth of generations, but did you notice the rest of that verse? "I the LORD thy God am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of the fathers upon the children unto the third and fourth generation of them that hate me; And shewing mercy unto thousands of them that love me, and keep my commandments." Exodus 20:5-6

It says that the curse goes to three or four generations. That would likely include several hundred children. But, the blessing goes much further as it is applied to thousands of our children coming in the future. The blessing is always much stronger than the curse! How do we pass this blessing on to future generations? We do it by loving God and obeying His word.

Remember, I am not saying your children will give account of your sin. The Bible says that each person must bear his own guilt. I am only saying that your children may have a tendency to have the same weaknesses that you have if they are not dealt with. Battles that you fight and win may be battles your children never have to fight, but even if they do, they will have your example of victory to follow.

"I call heaven and earth to record this day against you, that I have set before you life and death, blessing and cursing: therefore choose life, that both thou and thy seed may live."

**Deuteronomy 30:19**

One major change in my life has been the loss of my dad. My father passed away last August. I not only lost my dad, but I also lost my friend. Mom is alone now and having to chart new waters and experiences. As our parents age, we need to be careful to appreciate every moment. Only a few years ago, most of our students did not have access to the internet and went to the library to research their assignments, but now most students have the ability to use the internet as well as have access to it on their phones. If they don't know the answer, they just google it.

GoMix Radio has 100,000 listeners with the potential of reaching 2 million people. It has grown from one full-power station to 8 full-power stations. GoMix Radio also streams on the worldwide web which makes the outreach limitless. All of these changes have increased our budget and our needs across the board. Equipment



is growing old and needs to be replaced. We pay royalties on songs and buildings need to be repaired. And don't forget, the lightning strikes are more plentiful with 8 towers. We also are constantly adding new programs and songs while holding on to the great classics. GoMix is just that. It is a mix to appeal to different preferences and faiths. Even though our audience is changing, we desire to meet the needs of all Christians.

We changed the name of our ministry magazine from Carolina Life to Pathpointe because our ministry is no longer solely based in North Carolina. We send out magazines to 6000 Faith partners each month which includes articles to minister to each person. We also put the magazine online to ensure that everyone has access to it.

Our ministry, along with many others, has had to endure several tragedies over the last five years. In 2016, we experienced Hurricane Matthew, in 2018, we experienced Hurricane Florence, and this year we are experiencing the Coronavirus. Along with the expense of these events, we have had emotional and physical hardships. We persevered through the hurricanes, and we will persevere through Covid-19. God has been the


strength of the ministry, and He is our strength in personal tragedy as well.

How do we keep going when a loved one dies or is diagnosed with a terminal disease? What keeps us from total depression when our business fails or we are rejected by the ones we love? These heartaches are going to come because they cannot be avoided. There will always be difficult times, but we must move on and not let them control our lives. If we don't, then we lose our effectiveness for God because we stop ministering to others. The best medicine for making it through the changes a tragedy brings is to help someone else.

Like the seasons, the changes are going to come. How we handle those changes will determine our successes and how the Lord will use us. We must depend on Him. **Matthew 6:33** says that we must seek the Kingdom of God first, then everything else will come. He will help us through the changes, especially the tough ones.

So often we find ourselves walking in defeat. Even Christians can find themselves in this position and face repeated discouragement over their failures. I learned a secret recently that helped me figure out why I was failing so much: I had been excusing my sins as weaknesses, rather than calling them what they really were. In turn, my cries to God for His strength through His Spirit were seemingly unanswered, but it was all my fault. I just did not see.

I knew I wanted the Holy Spirit to fill me. I just could not seem to get His filling. I began searching the Scriptures, knowing most of the verses concerning Him, but still missing something...somehow. I felt defeated and knew I should have victory, but why wasn't I?

I began reading a book called "Spirit-Controlled Temperament" by Dr. Tim LaHaye. The first half of the book helped me to understand the four basic temperament types that make up the human race, and the second half told of how God through the Holy Spirit changes each of us from our fleshly self into a new creature.

As I read the book, there was a chapter on being filled with the Holy Spirit and the reasons most Christians never experience it. It said many Christians who are faithfully serving the Lord are about 95% on their way to being able to be filled with the Holy Spirit. However, it is the 5% they are holding back from surrendering to Him that hinders Him from being able to fill them. One cannot be filled with the Holy Spirit and sin at the same time.

As I took the words to heart, I also came across a chapter on the different forms the sins of anger and fear can take, and it opened my eyes to ways I had not realized I had been sinning. Would you believe the sin of anger can show up in sixteen different forms: bitterness, malice, clamor, envy, resentment, intolerance, criticism, revenge, wrath, hatred, seditions, jealousy, attack, gossip, sarcasm, and unforgiveness? The sin of fear slithers into our lives in the forms of: anxiety, doubts, timidity, indecision, superstition, withdrawal, loneliness, over-aggression, worry, inferiority, cowardice, suspicion, hesitancy, depression, haughtiness, and

social shyness. Or how about depression is most often from the sin of self-pity, unless in the rarer cases where there is a chemical imbalance of some sort.

As I began to see that my life was grieving and quenching the Holy Spirit through either anger, fear, or self-pity, I began to confess my sin to God and call it what it was – sin!

As I came to these realizations, I also saw it was time to let go of two to three things I had been holding onto tightly, unwilling to completely surrender them to Him. I began to pray, crying and surrendering them to Him. My heart ached as I struggled to let go, but I finally gave them and the future to Him. I had to willfully and purposefully...let go...surrender... and yield. Then the most amazing thing happened. There was no longer anything between me and my God, and now the Holy Spirit could fill me. I began to be amazed at the different way things looked around me and how I viewed those surrounding me. I began to see my husband, my children, my family, and the entire world differently. Did things around me change? No, they did not. But I was looking at them through His eyes and responding to problems through His Fruit of Galatians 5:22-23 – love, joy, peace, long-suffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, and temperance (self-control). It finally hit me that THIS was a life worth living! Now I was truly living. And it all began by dying to self!

Have I stayed filled with the Spirit since that time? No, sadly, sin has reared its ugly head, and my old nature has not stayed dead. I have to come to Him and repeat my confession of my sin and claim His forgiveness. This is why Paul tells us, "I die daily." (I Corinthians 15:31) I am trying to keep a short distance between my sin and my repentance. For I desperately know now just how much I really need Him and the difference between living without His filling and living with it. I still fail, and it is a constant battle to stay surrendered, but by God's grace, I want to keep walking with Him moment by moment, day by day.

May I recommend reading "Spirit-Controlled Temperament" if you struggle in your Christian walk? It has helped me tremendously to understand

others better, but most importantly to understand and see myself more clearly. It helped me to see what my strengths and weaknesses were. It taught me to surrender to God my weaknesses and view them as a challenge to be overcome rather than depressing failures. The book is not miraculous; it was the work God did in me as I remained open to what He wanted to teach me from this book. With God's help, through the work of the Holy Spirit, by the blood of Jesus, I can be a new Amber. Jesus came to save us from our sins. Not just for salvation and for all eternity, but to save us from our day to day sins we struggle with. My prayer had become, "Lord Jesus, save me from my sin." I had a besetting sin, as most of us do. Jesus came to save us from those too.

I had been battling doubts and fears about the near and far future, and of what seemed to be needed from me. I really and truly did not feel up to the task, that if it all rested on me, things were going to crumble. Once I surrendered to God fully, I gained new confidence and assurance that I really, really could "do all things through Christ, which strengtheneth me." Philippians 4:13. Now I know that I can do what lies ahead, for whatever comes, He will make me able to bear it. For He will be inside me, giving me exactly what I need to get the job done!

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
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
