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

For the first time since bad guys, we need heroes. We need grown-ups. We need men to put down the plastic fork, step away from the salad bar, and

untie the world from the tracks of complacency. It's time to get your hands dirty. It's time to answer the call of manhood. It's time (Dockers said) to wear the pants.

Whether Dockers makes good pants or not, I don't know. I also realize their main goal was to sell pants, not fix manhood. But they were right. Cities crumble without men living as men. Families fall apart without men living as men. We need heroes that don't beat up those they swore to protect, and heroes who are willing to take off their cupid pajamas, put down their frothy drinks, and act more like John Wayne; the very thing our sexless society is trying to make us all feel guilty about.

Too often we swing from decrying chauvinism and abuse, to producing a society of plastic manicured males who don't even like to identify as men. When our children look at men today, the kind in television shows, in many homes, and in

many classrooms, what do they see? What will men be like tomorrow? I shudder to think!!

The Days of a Manicured Male-hood Is Upon Us.

I realize that many of my readers are younger and are immunized from seeing what I see, but I am shocked at how many men act like women. Men who use lispy sentences, light gestures, soft mannerisms, and then dress up in their knickers like a four-year-old. Then they proudly display their manicured nails and shaved legs in front of our children. No hiding it. No shame. No apologizing. This perversion of masculinity is sickening to me. This may be malehood, but it is not man-hood.

Instead, our society celebrates what the Apostle Paul calls "soft men" (Greek malakoi), "effeminate"; a group that will not enter the kingdom of God (I Corinthians 6:9). Of course, the politically correct LGBTQ-XYZ community doesn't like what the Bible has to say about it. They distress over this shallnot-inherit-the-kingdom version of manliness to the degree that they can change the Bible to make it more acceptable to Pastor Sissy Pants. But as much as they protest it as hate speech, those who actively embrace the effeminate lifestyle are not Scripturally cauterized as the children of God, and it is unloving not to say so.

While men who brutalize and manipulate represent one form of perversion, men who sit passive, complacent, spiritually and emotionally frail, represent another. So also do men who rebel against their sex by acting like women. And

too many classrooms that celebrate this perversion act as a place to confuse the little boys (and girls) of today. Paul commands all men, "Watch ye, stand fast in the faith, quit (act like) you like men, be strong."

I Corinthians 16:13

Strong men are gentle. But they are not soft, fragile, weak, or effeminate. They do not faint in the day of adversity. They dress for war every day against forces of evil, because they know every day is a battle. These are men who charge against enemy gates, leading from the front, and refusing to take cover behind their wives and children like the Muslim cowards. They lead. They protect. They initiate. And their great and powerful commander, instead of handing them sweet platitudes to hurl at the enemy, the Bible says:



"He teacheth my hands to war; so that a bow of steel is broken by mine arms." II Samuel 22:35

YES, I Long for the Days When Men Killed the Dragons.

These men are like Moses, not Pharaoh. They do not lord their power in hopes of cowardly self-preservation. They stand against an empire, but they stand with the Lord of all empires, calling for tyrants to heed the God of heaven and earth. They are assertive, and yet they comprise the meekest men on the planet. They make unpopular decisions, meet regularly with their God, and constantly seek for, "what saith the Lord."

They are men like David, not Saul. They do not hide when duty calls. They gladly go into battle, when others will not. They kill tens of thousands of sins, and fight a more fearful enemy than Goliath ever was. They dress in armor provided by God Himself (Ephesians 6:13). They know much about warfare and yet can testify that it is God's gentleness that makes them great "Thou hast also given me the shield of thy salvation: and thy gentleness hath made me great (II Samuel 22:36).

smiley, flowy-haired, manicured, soft-serve Jesus. The Jesus of the Bible is the King of kings and the Lord of Lords, who will return with a sword in His mouth and heaven's army in His wake. He is the thrice holy man of war, the great redeemer, the sinner's friend, who calls all to repentance, faith, and obedience. Vengeance is His; He will repay, and that is a promise.

And yet, this same Jesus also calls little children to Himself. He washes the disciples' feet. He speaks gracious words to the oppressed, champions the widow's cause, and calls the contrite to come near. A bruised reed He does not break, and a faintly burning wick He does not snuff. Tough, yet tender.

Satan hates this kind of biblical masculinity. He pressures men like never before to apologize for being what God has made them to be. He hands him effeminacy, passivity, and pornography. He calls it for the good of society as he sends the Delilah of feminism to strip man of his passion, ambition, and strength. Satan laughs at men who ache inside, knowing something inside has died, but not knowing what, as they watch a movie like True Grit or Braveheart.

It is hard for the modern male to understand the words of William Wallace: "Every man dies, but not every man truly lives." Lord, please, if I have to go into battle let me follow a man. A man like Lieutenant Colonel Hal Moore (in the movie We Were Soldiers) who said:

"I can't promise you that I will bring you all home alive. But this I swear, before you and before Almighty God, that when we go into battle, I will be the first to set foot on the field, and I will be the last to step off, and I will leave no one behind. Dead or alive, we will all come home together. So, help me, God."

I am not endorsing movies, and I realize that some may have questionable content, I am just saying real men realize that something is dying in this *manicured male-hood* that exist today. Satan hates it that God made both male and female, because we are created different but equal, to do God's specialized work while meeting the specialized needs of each other. "For whatsoever is born of God overcometh the world: and this is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith."

I John 5:4

I truly believe with all my heart that every word in the Bible is there for a purpose and a reason. Every word is important and is a part of God's plan for us. One day while reading God's Word, I took note of something I felt I needed to further study; the words Faith and Trust.

Many times people use faith and trust to mean the same thing. My study soon revealed they are not the same in meaning or purpose. If that were the case, God would have only used one word, so there has to be some type of difference between them. Now, while faith and trust do carry different meanings, they still are dependent on each other to fulfill their purpose.

Let's begin with faith. The Bible says in Romans 10:17, "So then faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the

word of God." Most often the word faith is used in the form of a noun and is based on the fact of knowing. It is for this reason the Scriptures encourage us to study, read, and meditate thus gathering more information that builds our faith. No one has faith in Jesus or God without first receiving some type of information about them.

The Bible states in **Hebrews 11:6**, "But without faith it is impossible to please him..." We cannot please God without first knowing who He is and what pleases Him and doesn't please Him.

For example, let's consider a man who has begun dating. He wants to please this new girl that he really likes, so he sends her an arrangement of red roses. Nice thought huh? But later he finds out she really loves yellow roses. While she might appreciate the red roses, the yellow ones would have really pleased her because she would have known he not only invested money in his gift, but also time to find out what she really loved.

The Scripture in **Hebrews** goes on to say, "...for he that cometh to God must believe (know) that he is (exists)..." Again, it is the gathering of information based on truth that builds our faith and pleases God. Jesus said all things are possible to them that believe. We don't believe anything we don't have knowledge about. So, faith is the fact of knowing the things God has made available to us. Jesus even gave us the Holy Spirit as our Teacher to help us grow in wisdom, knowledge, and understanding, which builds our faith.

Now, let's look at trust. In the Scriptures, trust is used in verb form and implies the act of doing. It is putting into action our faith. Consider Romans 1:17, "For therein is the righteousness of God revealed from faith (knowing) to faith (knowledge): as it is written, The just shall live (act of doing based upon) by faith (fact of knowing)."

There are a lot of people who know a lot about God, but they have nothing to do with Him. They have faith that He exists, but they don't trust Him to be their God. Many Believers have faith in who Jesus is and what He has done, but they don't trust Him to do anything for them. Therefore faith (knowledge of spiritual things) without works (the action of trust) is dead.

Please allow me to share the story of Charles Blondin, a tightrope walker in 1859. Blondin was best known for his daring stunt of walking a 1,100 footlong tightrope across Niagara Falls several times. Crowds came out by the thousands to see the event. Over several weeks they watched Blondin walk forward and backward across the rope. He took a picture with a box camera half way across on the rope. He crossed blindfolded, did backflips, pushed a wheelbarrow across, and even cooked an omelet during one trip crossing the Niagara Falls. The people's FAITH grew in Blondin. They knew his talent was great and his ability to walk the tightrope was unquestionable. But in August 1859, the crowd was horrified to see Blondin coming across the rope with his manager, Harry Colcord, on his back. In that moment, Blondin and Colcord became one as he walked that tightrope. They successfully crossed. The moral of this true story is this; while the crowds had Faith in Blondin to walk the rope across Niagara Falls, only Colcord had Trust that Blondin could carry him also. Colcord had faith (knowledge of Blondin's ability) and trust (act of allowing Blondin to carry him).



It is extremely important to have faith and increase it by learning more of God's Word as often as possible. But it is equally important that we act upon what we already know about God's Word, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit.

Jesus said in Matthew 16:24, "Then said Jesus unto his disciples, If any man will come after me (decision based on faith), let him deny (action of trust) himself, take up (action of trust) his cross, and follow (action of trust) me."

I pray this message will help you in your walk with Jesus. He has so much in store for each of us. The Holy Spirit is eager to teach us greater things to build our faith. He will also show us how to put it into action daily. In closing, I believe James 1:22 says it best, "But be ye doers (trust) of the Word (faith), and not hearers only, deceiving your own selves."
