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What Defines YOUP

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, which according to his abundant mercy hath begotten us again unto a lively (living) hope by the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead,"

I Peter 1:3

When Peter wrote this letter to the Christians living in Asia Minor, he called them "strangers." He was not saying that because he had never personally met them, nor was he indicating that they had recently relocated. Actually, they were the same people they had always been, but now through their relationship with Jesus Christ, they had become strangers and aliens; living in one country, yet belonging to another.

Quite often, people from another culture stand out. It may be their clothing, their appearance, their skin color, or their language. Actually, it could be a number of things, but usually they look different, not better, nor worse; but different. Aliens stand out.

As Christians we are strangers and aliens. However, we are not set off by a specific style of dress. Christians should dress modestly; but we don't wear uniforms with a big cross on the front. We don't have our own language or distinct way of talking. Hopefully, we have put away gossip and evil speaking, but Christians usually speak their native language. We don't belong to a specific class, nationality, or race. We often associate people from certain parts of the world with a certain religion, but Christians live all over the world. We don't all live in or hail from a specific geographical area. Likewise, we

don't have specific dietary laws that distinguish us from others. Actually, we are not defined or distinguished by any of the things that normally mark off one people from another.

So, what is it that makes Christians to be peculiar and strange wherever we go? What makes us different? I suppose there are many traits that should make us different from others, but let's discuss two.

The First Trait is Love.

We will cover this quickly because it is something we all know. What does the greatest command hinge upon? Love. What will be the defining characteristic of followers of Jesus? Love. What will never pass away, even after faith and hope are gone? Love.

Love is the mark of the disciple. Jesus said, "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another." (John 13:35) It is not our Bible knowledge that makes us different nor our stance on public issues. Those things are certainly important, but according to our Lord, the defining mark of a Christian is love.

But, before we move on, there is one problem I would like to mention. The word love has been so diluted and overused it no longer has much meaning. Consider how many times you may use the word love in the average day. We "love" ice cream, apple pie, puppies, and our favorite shirt. We may love certain music, spring showers, and Christmas. We are a culture that is in love with being in love. As a result, to say that "love" is one of the indicators of the disciples of Jesus doesn't mean very much.

Yet, our Lord shows us that what passes for love today, is not what He had in mind. Christian love, the kind of love that would mark His disciples, is a pure love that stands out in its uniqueness. Jesus teaches us that real love is sacrificial, it is demonstrated by action, and it always takes the initiative. Real love is unconditional and doesn't wait for someone to show themselves to be lovable or worthy of our love. Christian love reaches out and pursues; just like Jesus did for us:

Of course, before you can really love others, you need to recognize that you are unconditionally, irrevocably, and ridiculously loved by God just as you are. Whoever you are, wherever you've been,

whatever you've done in the course of your life, God loves you and will accept you through His Son Jesus Christ.

The Second Trait is Hope.

Hope along with love defines us and distinguishes us as believers. In I Peter 1:3, Peter says God hath "begotten us again unto a lively (living) hope by the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead." We have been born again to a living hope. We need to accept the fact that you and I have hope because we were born that way; we were born with it.

I was born a Worthington. That came with certain connotations. gave me my genetic disposition. Peter's readers were born into an identity too. Perhaps some were Jews, some were Greeks or Romans. Maybe others were born into specific tribes or people groups. Perhaps others were defined by their race, tongue, or occupation. Whatever may have defined them before, because of God's love and by the power of God's Spirit, they now were born again. And what is one of the main identities that comes with this new birth? Hope. Hope is the family resemblance all should be able to see in us. Hope is our family culture and birthright.

In I Peter 1:4, Peter explains this hope as an inheritance so precious and unprecedented that he can describe it best by what what it is not

It is Incorruptible: It won't wither and die like everything else. Pure hope cannot be diluted by trash.

It is Undefiled: It can't be corrupted by our selfishness, our fear of losing it, our pride over it, or our unrealistic and disappointed expectations of it.

It is Unfading: It won't bring joy that flares up and then burns out, leaving you wondering what's next.





This inheritance, grounded on the work of Christ and guarded by God's power, helps to define the life of the Christian. This same hope that grounds our lives as Christians also sets our lives apart from who we once were and from the lives of those whose hopes are different. In Peter's first chapter, setting up a section on Christian holiness, he describes a before and after that hinges on hope. "Not fashioning yourselves according to the former lusts" (I Peter 1:14). That was then. Now, instead, "be sober and hope to the end" (I Peter 1:13).

It's not that Christians are hopeful now when they weren't hopeful at all before. It's that we now live with a different hope than what we lived with before, and it fuels a different passion. In our ignorance, we set our hopes in the near-at-hand and kept our expectations low. We were carried along by our wants and desires, always aiming for all kinds of easy to gain pleasures and short-term possessions. We looked for a meaningful life in the realm of the perishable, the defiled, and the fading.

One mark of the new birth is that now we clearly see the temporary nature of all those hopes on which we were tempted to build our lives. I think that's why Peter, writing again of the new birth (I Peter 1:23–24), ends his discourse with a partial quote from Isaiah 40. When we look at the entire quote it reads like this:

"All flesh is grass, and all the goodliness thereof is as the flower of the field: The grass withereth, the flower fadeth: because the spirit of the LORD bloweth upon it: surely the people is grass. The grass withereth, the flower fadeth: but the word of our God shall stand for ever."

Isaiah 40: 6-8

Peter reminds them that everything they formerly hoped in withers away, but now they are building upon the only hope that will stand the test of time. It's with the image of withering grass in the background that Peter describes the Christian as a spiritual house built on a new and better cornerstone, "a living stone, disallowed indeed by men, but chosen of God, and precious" (I Peter 2:4). It's an unmistakable contrast: the grass that withers, the flower that falls, and the cornerstone that rests in

its place forever. The storms may destroy everything else, but not that which is secured by the unwithering living stone.

Of course, many ways exist for Christians to show their alien identity. Much of what Peter writes from this point lays out these differences, one by one.

Because of hope we treat each other differently, we view worldly power with a different perspective, and we are empowered to respond differently to suffering. Any suffering, from man's point of view, is always a negative. But, with Christ as our cornerstone, we understand suffering may come, but we also see that suffering can be productive and fully redeemed, just like it was for Christ.

So, for a bit of self-examination, may I ask, "What defines vou"? Yes, you may be known by your occupation, political persuasions, or your personality. But as a Christian, you should be defined by your love and by your hope. Love is most important, but in today's world we also need a heavy dose of hope. With all the darkness that surrounds us, we must have—and we must display to the world—that we are people of optimism. We can look far into the horizon and see what others cannot see; thus, we have hope.




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Autumn Gardens

"...clouds they are without water, carried about of the winds; trees whose fruit withereth, without fruit, twice dead, plucked up by the roots;"

Jude 12

In the Book of Jude, we read that false teachers are compared to autumn trees without fruit, implying that autumn should be a fruitful season. It should be the most abundant season of the year. "Be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about, seeking whom he may devour:"

I Peter 5:8

Guard the precious seed you have planted. Then, as you faithfully watch and pray over the garden, you can look forward with great anticipation to receiving God's blessings as harvest season arrives.

I remember seeing a picture of some elephants. These elephants, although massive in size with great physical strength, were kept constrained by a small fence. The elephants allowed a fence that was only a few inches high to restrict their movements.

Using their great strength, the elephants could have easily trampled the fence, but they behaved as if a fortified wall restricted their movements. Apparently, it takes but a small fence to restrain an elephant as long as he is unwilling to challenge its power.



God's people are more like the powerful elephant who has restrained himself inside a weak, but unchallenged

fence. Thus, they have self-imposed a limitation on their thoughts, behaviors and faith. They have hindered their growth and liberty. Their fences have kept them from the resources of God's blessings which could so easily be in reach.

How big is your world? What self-imposed boundaries or parameters are restricting your walk with God? What worlds of blessing have your fences robbed from you and your family?

I sometimes have a difficult time deciding what to share in my articles. First, I want to write what the Lord wants me to say, and secondly, I must not waste your time. Time is the most precious commodity any of us have.

I decided to share with you what the Lord taught me recently. If you are discouraged by what you see around you, perhaps you will find a renewed purpose as I did. I was watching a news show Monday night, and it gave some statistics. Tucker Carlson was speaking about what was going on in USA, Russia, and China. He shared a lot of political facts that I really found dumbfounding.

He spoke of how our current administration has weakened our military in several ways. Our Navy seals are probably the healthiest people in our country, and many of them were fired because they were not vaccinated. Sixty Thousand

National Guard soldiers were also fired because of not taking the vaccine. On one of our bases, they had a drag queen contest while the children were playing in a bouncy house. It was a family affair. We are admitting mentally unstable people and those with a low IQ that previously would not have been allowed to enlist in our military. We had this rule because it is not safe for an individual who cannot think clearly in a crisis, and it is unsafe for them to have a gun. The military only has half the quota of recruits for this fiscal year. Of course, I understand why many people would not want to serve under this administration.

He also spoke about how China makes 90 percent of the antibiotics, Tylenol, and Ibuprofen, 96 % of the shipping containers, and 80 % of the cranes as well as many other needed supplies. Taiwan makes 90 percent of the semiconductor chips which we use in our cars, airplanes,

electronics, etc. He spoke of how China would like to control Taiwan, and he believes that is in their plans for the future. He stated that China is just waiting.

Anyway, I began to think about all of these things. What is China waiting on? Are they making sure we are not a threat? Do they want to make sure they are stronger than we are? Their navy is already larger than ours, and they are building up their air power. How long will this take? I bet it is sooner than they expected. I am sure they are as surprised as we are at how fast the current administration has hurt America. My husband says that China was thinking they would be stronger by 2027. I wonder if that is their projection now.

What does all of this mean? It means that if the Lord tarries, and eventually if things don't change, we will be controlled by China without them firing a shot. China

will control our electronics among other things, and Russia will control our oil and possibly our food. Do you realize what that means? Is that scary to you? It is to me.

I look at America and see that many of our citizens are oblivious to what is going on in our world. I look at our leaders and weep. Our children are growing up in this America. What is our future? What is their future?

I really got down in the dumps. Why bother? I was driving to work Tuesday morning thinking of all of these things, and I reminded myself that the only hope for the future is our Lord. If we look around, we see many of our adults are weak. If they met Jesus, He could make them strong!

I also realized that our children need to be taught to stand and not be ashamed. We need to teach them to make wise decisions. If the world has its way, our children will be screen zombies and "yes" people. They will not know how to fight for what is right, and they will not have the common sense to know how to make wise decisions.

We have a school filled with children this year. Along with their parents and their church homes, we are their only hope. What are we teaching them? How do we teach them?

What do we do? We must disciple them and we must teach them by our lives and our examples. We must teach them to study their Bibles and depend on God. We must win souls to Jesus, and then disciple them.

"Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world."

Matthew 28:19-20

The first command in verse 19 is to win the lost. We must teach people about God's Word and what it means to be saved. We must be fervent. How many children or people have you led to the Lord in your lifetime? If not, why not?

Once we have led them to the Lord, we must teach them to observe all things, which means we must teach them to obey the Word of God. We must teach them that God is with them, and they should go out and witness. Teaching is the work of the church, and we are a part of that church. If we don't share Christ with a lost and dying world, there is no hope. This world is going to crash and burn one day because God said it would. But how many people accept the Lord before He comes back is up to the Christians and how fervently they share about His Word.

I am concerned about the future of America and the future of our children. But America's only hope is that we teach the Word and show them the way. If we teach our children to be good Christians, they will be good citizens. They will fight against abortion, and they will stand for what is right in our country. They will cry when a policeman gets gunned down. They will vote for the man that wants to make

America strong and vote for values that stand on the Scripture.

So my attitude changed about halfway to work. As I was thinking of the horribleness that lay ahead and the thought of being beholden to Russia and China, I became encouraged. I realized that we have a tough time ahead, but I can be a part of the solution. I can make a difference by making a difference in the lives of these children and by investing in their parents.

It is not time to throw in the towel. Children need our love and attention. We need to teach them the way. We will not be defeated. We are going to stand tall and attack the wicked one. He will not take our children without a fight.

We are all here in this world for a purpose, and we must fight until the Lord tells us to lay down our mantle. My time is not now. We must not lose sight of our purpose here. As long as we have breath, we must fight to deliver the Lord's message. I hope I will be able to say these words at the end of my life as Paul did when he was at the end of his life:

"I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith:"

2 Timothy 4:7-8

Will you be able to say these words when your days are over? I hope we all will.

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Monument Or Mission?

In today's economy, is it wise to raise money to build and operate Christian radio stations? Actually, encouraging listeners to contribute funding is inherently neither right or wrong. In some cases, God is glorified through the financing, construction, and operation of a Christian radio station. In other cases, through massive indebtedness, incompetence, extravagance, pride, and facility misuse, God is dishonored. Obviously, prayer is always needed before you contribute.

I know during times of economic hardship people may criticize a ministry by saying, "If that money was given to the poor, far greater things could be accomplished." This is sometimes true and it will need prayerful consideration. On the other hand, by serving the Christian community and reaching out to the unsaved, a Scriptural ministry provides evangelism, encouragement, and edification. Ultimately, the poor and hurting may be ministered to in a far greater degree because of the investment that was made in the faithful ministry.

We must continually strive to be sure the burden of funding, building, and maintaining radio stations doesn't become our main mission. At *GoMix Christian Radio*, our mission has never been radio stations, *it is people*. Distractions from this mission cannot be accepted. We must consciously battle the rationalizations that so often turn churches and Christian organizations away from building Christ's kingdom to building their own.

Some things, like the Cape Hatteras Lighthouse, can serve two distinct and worthwhile purposes. It assuredly served a very useful mission, yet it is also recognized as a grand historic monument. The dividing lines for ministries are not quite as clear. So for us, we shall strive to forgo the illusion of a monument. You see, just like your church building, Christian radio stations should be tools for ministry, not monuments to man.
